The eruption of Taal Volcano on January 12, 2020 caught the country by surprise.

But because LOVE delivers, neither distance nor the volcano's fury deterred NVC from shipping Mingo Meals merely two days after, distribution overseen by our Field staff who travelled to the site for the purpose.

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BIGGER CRISIS, DEEPER LOVE

The crisis that developed after the eruption of Taal Volcano suddenly seemed small against the backdrop of the COVID-19 crisis that ultimately filled up the whole year's calendar.

NVC Foundation's responses came in three phases:

1. Immediate/emergency response

This primarily focused on the distribution of Mingo Meals which we immediately set forth to ship what was needed to complete the six-month period for children enrolled in the program. This meant shipping to various destinations in Luzon, Visayas and Mindanao so that children under the program would not be wanting in their supply requirements in case lockdowns deter mobility and shipments.



2. Covid-19 response Phase 1

- Mingo Meals were distributed for children of families whose incomes were compromised, knowing that children's nutritional support should not be interrupted.
- Personal Protective Equipment (PPE's) were also manufactured and distributed since sourcing and importing was a challenge during the first few months of virus onset.
- The Feeding Force Mealbags which contained rice, fish, vegetables and Mingo Meals were distributed as numbers of hungry families grew.

3. Covid-19 response Phase 2

- The Feeding Force veggie bags containing fresh fruits and vegetables were supplied on a weekly basis to shoreline families where access to such is difficult.
- Food Security projects were also initiated to provide continued supply of food and potential income for families.

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MINGO MEALS: an emergency's first responder

Children's nutrition is a primary concern for us at NVC Foundation, thus the Mingo Production Plant continued to operate even during COVID-19 lockdowns.

Powered by support from generous hearts all over the world, we were able to send Mingo supplies both through conduits and our own distribution network. Just as the crisis was looming, we provided the Provincial Government of Negros Occidental, interfaith Church groups, multi sectoral organizations and institutions, as well as barangay level government units, with Mingo Meals to feed children in families which were economically deprived due to the COVID-19 crisis.

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A LOVE CIRCLE

As the crisis wore on, the circle of people lacking meals on their tables kept growing bigger. At the same time, our partner small farmers were suffering from income loss because product demand from restaurants and supermarkets decreased. The same happened to fishermen who once received Peter Project boats from NVC.

To complete the circle of need and love and giving, we created The Feeding Force project which focused solely on the distribution of food to hungry families, especially those affected through the Covid-19 crisis. Fruits and vegetables were sourced from our partner small farmers, fish from the Peter Project fishermen, and stuffed into meal bags which included rice and Mingo Meals. These meal bags, which contained meals which could provide five meals for a family of five, were sponsored by loving hearts and distributed to families in need.

LOVE NEVER ENDS

When businesses began opening up, some lives began to breathe better, but of course, the lack of good and balanced meals was still a challenge. The Feeding Force bags containing fresh fruits and vegetables were distributed to families living in the shorelines.

This focus was due to a study* (and backed by our own observations on the field) which indicates that there was noticeably 50% more underweight, 37% more stunting and 70% more wasting (an indicator of synergism of malnutrition and morbidity where children are not only short but also emaciated) among children in the coastal areas versus other areas in the lowlands.

Families were sponsored on sets of weekly distributions for three months.

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LOVE SPROUTS FROM SEEDS

Food, it has been said, can be an agent of change in distressed communities. But more than that, NVC believes that unless food self sufficiency is attained, there can never be true development or real progress made in lifting people out of poverty. This need for sustainability in matters of food even became more pronounced during the COVID-19 crisis. Thus, NVC places deep focus in three Food Self-Sufficiency projects

HOPE FROM POTS, GARDENS AND FARMS

The cultivation by neighborhood marginalized families of idle land in urban areas with permission of the lot owners, is the essence of the Gardens of Hope project while container gardening of edible plants in crowded spaces is that of the Pots of Hope project. At the end of 2020, one Garden of Hope was already operational, while start-up of another had to be postponed because of active COVID-19 cases in the target site. Assistance to two Farmers of Hope communities in Davao del Norte and one in Negros Occidental was intensified.

Love delivers as always and while Mingo Meals were the usual steady staple for our emergency relief operations, NVC's donors also helped rebuild homes for families who lost theirs to wind and water.

THE WAR GOES ON

From the day we churned out the first gram of Mingo Meals, we have been at war: the war against malnutrition.

Our best weapon is the 6-month daily feeding protocol for Mingo Meals, which starts off with meticulous gathering of data which is usually done either by NVC's Field Team or our ground partners. This includes the nutritional condition of the children determined by their weights versus their heights and their ages. Their family background, including their parents' income and educational levels are also taken note.

Children's progress due to Mingo Meals intake is measured and any regress or problems along the way are determined, and addressed whenever possible.

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LOVE FOR THE PROVINCE WE ARE NAMED AFTER

As 2019 was ending, Negros Occidental Governor Eugenio Jose Lacson brought up with concern the state of malnutrition of children in the province during a meeting of the Provincial Council for the Protection of Children. He cited that 10.4% of the province's children were stunted and 3.9% were either Underweight or Severely Underweight.

On Love Day (February 14) of 2020, the Provincial Government of Negros Occidental approved NVC Foundation's proposal for a Complementary Feeding Program that would provide Mingo Meals as supplemental food for 2,000 infants and toddlers identified as malnourished in the ten Local Government Units with the highest degree of malnutrition. This would be given to the children following NVC's program protocol of daily feeding for six months.



On September 10 of the same year, Gov Lacson endorsed the funds to NVC to kick-off the program. Start-up was not smooth, and was beset with challenges due to COVID-19. Restricted entries to some barangays due to incidence of COVID, and even the paralysis of some local Health Offices when their own staff had to go on quarantine, (because they were either exposed to the virus or were hit by it), were among the challenges. But because NVC had already started ground work in some accessible areas even before the release of funds, program kick-off was ready in some areas just shortly over a week after the funds were received.



By the end of 2020, progress was already seen in some of the children who moved from Severely Underweight or Underweight to Normal. The program runs until March – June 2021, depending on the month it was initiated in a particular LGU.

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BEAUTY WILL SAVE THE WORLD

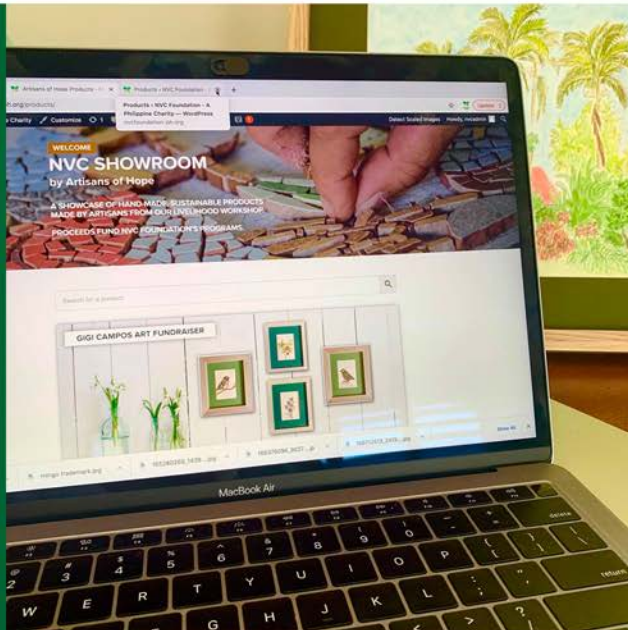

Indeed, in NVC’s language of love, the beautiful objects crafted in our Artisans of Hope livelihood workshop not only put food on the table for the ones whose hands participated in the process of transforming trash to art pieces. A hundred percent of the excess funds earned from the contributions made in exchange for the pieces, were all converted into Mingo Meals for the hungry and undernourished.

Working from home and supervised remotely using virtual technology, the artisans continued to earn even while people in homes around them were losing their jobs due to lockdowns. In keeping with the times, the workshop released pieces which reflected the current mood: table top statuettes of ladies with protective face masks, art pieces of plants and plantitas, and scenes which reflected hope.

In perfect timing, NVC’s online store at www.nvcshowroom.com was launched midyear, and became a perfect selling platform for our artisan products in the absence of exhibits and shows requiring physical presence. Using our online store plus participation in other established online sales platforms, coupled with active social media presence, allowed the Artisans of Hope livelihood workshop to end the year with a total sales figure even higher than of sales activities of previous years which required physical presence in Trade Shows.



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LOVE FROM AROUND THE WORLD

LOVE was the only reason behind LOVE which came from around the world.

Love came from a kitchen in Dusseldorf, Germany baking pan de sal, from a rising entrepreneur's artistically crafted cheese cake in California, an artisan kitchen in Nevada creating Pan del Sols, a startup in Metro Manila baking non-carb bread and from so many ones in our native province churning out an assortment of yummies from flatquillos to pasta to cookies to baked sushi.
