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ABOUT US



We are a relatively young and small provincial based organization.

Established in August 2010 in Bacolod City, Philippines, we trace our beginnings to a group of private citizens who believe that when individuals pool together energies, resources, talents and skills, they can contribute effectively towards building a better future for Filipinos.

To fuel its programs, NVC harnesses the power of individuals, organizations and institutions to link dreams to donors and donors to dreams to create positive and lasting change, especially for the marginalized.

NVC is a non-stock, non-profit organization registered under the Philippine Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) and with the Department of Social Welfare (DSWD).



WE ARE AT WAR!



It is a war that we have been fighting for about a decade now.

Our best weapon in this war comes in a small pack called Mingo Meals, a nutritious instant complementary food with a base of rice, monggo (mung beans) and malunggay (moringa) and primarily designed for infants and toddlers but is also used for older children in areas of need.

In our war, preparation to battle begins with meticulous gathering of data which is usually done either by NVC's Field Team or our ground partners – in most cases the Barangay Nutrition Scholars- in a village where malnutrition is prevalent.

In the six-month nutrition protocol, children in the program are monitored and any regress or problems along the way are determined and addressed whenever possible.

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No mountain is too tall and no body of water too deep for NVC and partners in the quest to bring Mingo to where it is needed most.

Within this period, 18,387 children from 88 different locations across the country, were enrolled in the nutrition program bringing totals to 49,931 children served by the program since Mingo was first manufactured in 2011.



NVC's nutrition program embraced another age level through a school age feeding program that involved a full circle of feeding and food security for children of small farmers from the Indigenous Peoples in upland San Carlos City, Negros Occidental.

Students of different ages from three schools were served nutritionist designed hot meals using ingredients from produce of their farmer parents and cooked by their mothers in school for which they were given a small stipend. On weekends, the children were provided take-home kits of Mingo Meals and fresh fruits.

The program, sponsored by Metrobank Foundation, served to benefit the whole family with both income and nutritional support. The program included education on hygiene and nutrition by NVC's ground partners.

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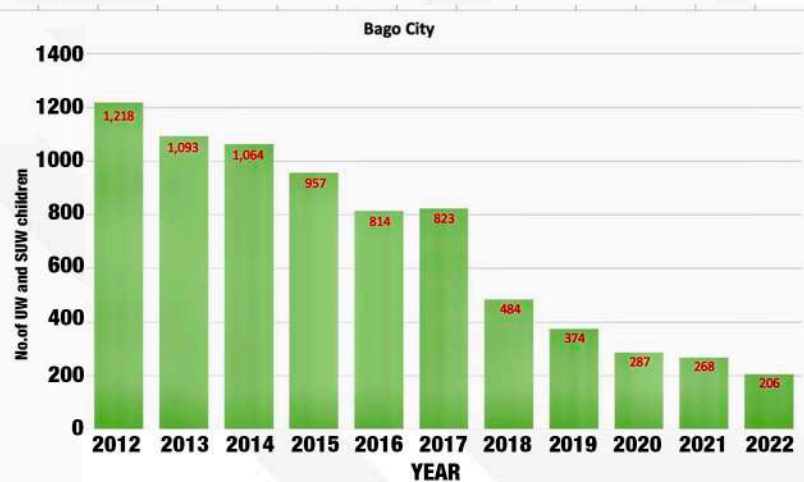


The proof of the pudding is in eating Mingo and in the graph!

Six years ago, the Health and Nutrition officials of Bago City, Negros Occidental had never heard of Mingo. But during one of their rounds, they visited a farm where they saw a significant drop in numbers of malnourished kids, and they discovered that the farm owner had been providing Mingo to the children.

The team decided to place a trial order of 2,000 sachets that year and in the following year, 2017, Bago City increased their consumption to 26,000. Of this, 17,000 were purchased in the last quarter.

The graph shows a marked drop in the city's malnutrition rate after their significant order of Mingo which became a staple in the following years. In the year 2021, the city had distributed 33,500 Mingo servings to its malnourished children.

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Disaster Response



Because children's nutrition is NVC Foundation's primary concern, our first responders are always armed with Mingo Meals. In fact, our Mingo Production Plant always carries an inventory that is ready to be picked up at any time a sudden need arises for emergency relief operations.

From Typhoon Odette in 2021 to Typhoon Karding in 2022, Mingo always left its warehouse towards the disaster location within 24 hours of the catastrophe. NVC served southern Negros Occidental extensively in the aftermath of Typhoon Odette, while it focused on the island of Polillo in Quezon Province where Typhoon Karding made its first landfall.

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RELIEF

Because Typhoon Odette hit close to home, NVC provided not only Mingo for children affected by the disaster, but became the conduit for individuals, organizations and corporations who wished to provide food aid in various forms: food packs containing an assortment of goods or bulk and volume packages and containers. The NVC Team also engaged in or managed the repacking of food donations which arrived in bulk.

As a matter of habit, distance or difficult terrain never deterred NVC from reaching any community needing food support.

REBUILD NVC HOUSING



With design assistance from local architects, NVC embarked on the construction of more than 100 homes for families who lost theirs to Typhoon Odette in southern Negros Occidental, helping them choose safer locations and providing them the means to build better.

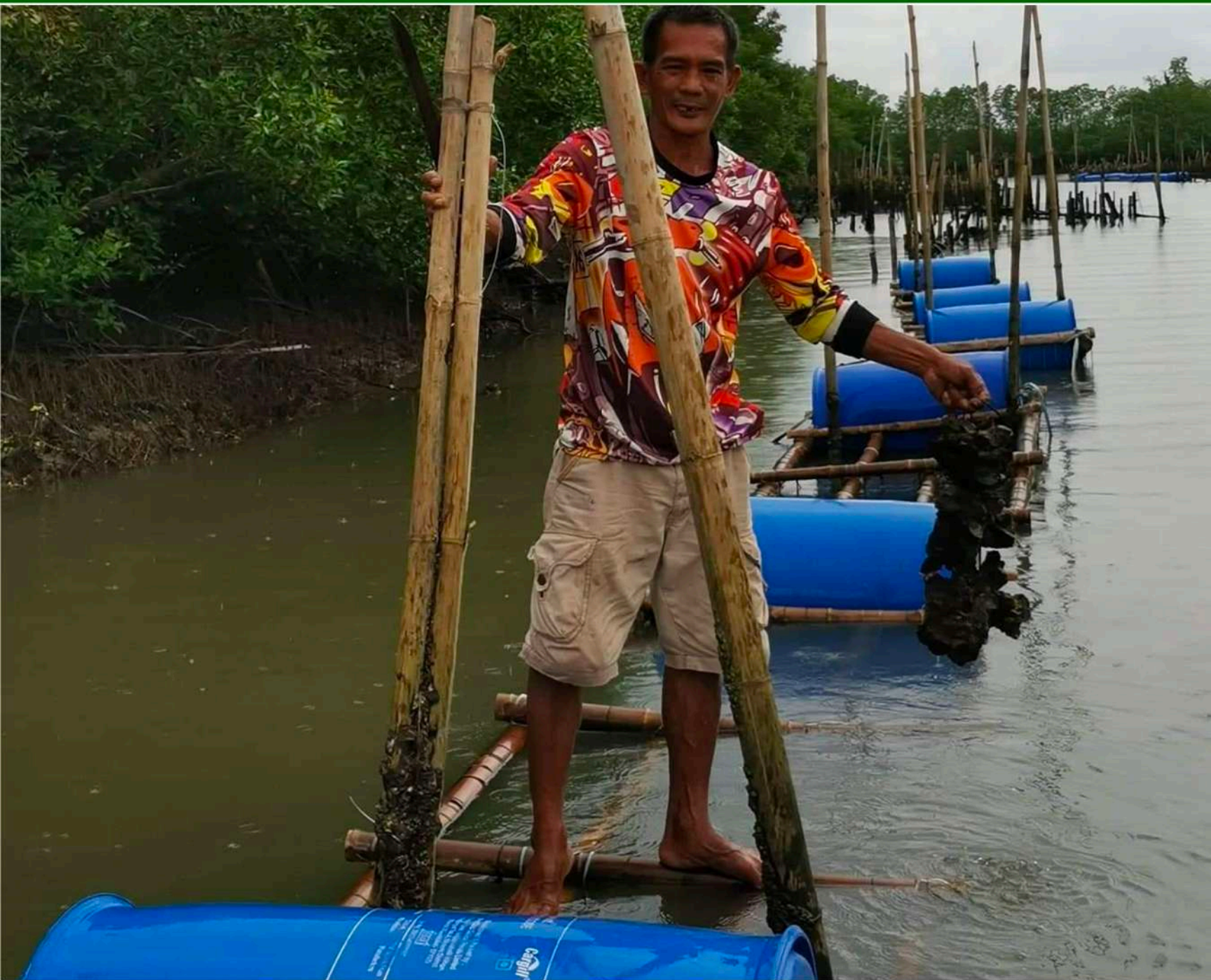
REBUILD ANGAT BUHAY HOUSING



NVC Foundation also became the ground partner of former Vice President Leni Robredo's Angat Buhay project which provided starter shelter kits to 250 families in 6 LGUs of Negros Occidental who were worst hit by the typhoon. A local chapter of the United Architects of the Philippines who volunteered to VP Robredo to train the recipient families on good construction techniques, helped provide added inputs to the recipients.

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RESTORE

NVC Foundation also engaged in the restoration of livelihood to people who lost access to theirs because of natural disasters.

Even when NVC Foundation was implementing the Mingo Meals Nutrition Program in the Indigenous Peoples communities in Bukidnon and Davao del Norte, we looked at food security projects as the source of continued good nutrition for the children as well as a source of income for their families.

The Covid-19 crisis furthered our resolve to help communities find means to develop sustainable sources of food both for family consumption and increased income.

In San Isidro, Davao del Norte, with the help of Control Union Philippines who helped us provide 89 farmers who till 81 hectares of land with farm tools and implements, planting materials and technical support, a bounty from an assortment of crops both from land and water provided the community added resources. The project which was also assisted by our ground partners San Isidro Local Government Unit, Brgy. Igangon San Isidro, Revitalized Police sa Brgy. Igangon, Department of Trade and Industry (DTI), Municipal Agriculture Office (AGRO), Provincial Agriculture Office (PAGRO), 60th Infantry Battalion, jump started the families into being able to independently develop their own food and income source.

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FARMERS OF HOPE

San Carlos, Negros Occidental

In San Carlos, Negros Occidental, 80 farmers from the Indigenous Peoples who own 100 hectares of ancestral domain and organized as the Bukidnon Organic Farmers Association, have been supplying most of our requirements for raw materials in the NVC Mingo Manufacturing plant for several years. Over time, we have helped assist them by providing farm tools, equipment, technology, organization skills training and planting materials from various donors.

Soon to rise in the community will be a food manufacturing plant which will process the farmers' crops so they leave the territory in lighter form thus saving carbon footprint, while this allows the women, who are intended to operate the plant, with additional earnings thereby doubling family income. The provision of food processing equipment is made possible by Sunlife Foundation whose grant also covers a portion of building construction costs. Base Bahay Foundation will provide the design and construction of a disaster resilient building with innovative use of bamboo preserved through their patented technology.

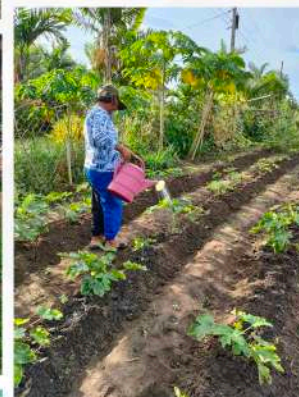
GARDENS OF HOPE

Talisay City, Negros Occidental /
Helvetia, Bacolod City

Food security for smaller communities is the vision behind the establishment of two Gardens of Hope, one in Talisay, Negros Occidental and the other in Helvetia, Bacolod City.

It was the rise of joblessness and corresponding hunger after the onset of the Covid-19 crisis that pushed NVC to seek landowners who would allow the temporary use of their urban lots so that marginalized families in the neighborhood can put the land to productive use.

Both communities have been harvesting food crops both for home use and for added income while one of the gardens has established a section for vermiculture.

A newspaper article five years ago about an emaciated 12 year old malnourished boy who had the weight of a four year who passed away in Zamboanga del Sur brought NVC Foundation to Glab, his home village. We searched for his community because knew that if one child dies from malnutrition in a community, that means that there were more of the same who may be saved.

We started off by enrolling 175 children in the Mingo Meals Nutrition Program and did another round later for 180 more. We returned to Glab this year with the resolve that we would not only feed 126 more children, but to make this Subanen community of Indigenous Peoples more food secure.

FOOD BANKS AND COMMUNITY PANTRIES



Inspired by and with help from Rise Against Hunger Philippines, we are recipient to near expiring food products from manufacturers and distributors. Upon receipt we distribute these to care institutions for the poor such as orphanages and home for the aged to provide them much needed food support. We also distribute these to indigent communities from among our beneficiaries and those of other non-government organizations.

We also organized and supported community pantries of concerned citizens during the peak of the Covid-19 pandemic when hunger incidence increase due to joblessness and absence of livelihood opportunities. Most of the food distributed were sourced from small farmers and marginalized fishermen who were likewise affected by the crisis.

TAKING CARE OF SCHOOL NEEDS



When face to face classes resumed, parents from impoverished families were faced with challenges of providing their children basic school needs. We have come face to face with parents who needed to split a pencil for three siblings to share because they could only afford to buy one. Some parents cannot even afford to buy a single one.

Uniforms may not be mandatory but owning several sets of clothes for school wear is even more difficult. And uniforms also build a child's self esteem and are better equalizers.

NVC's own family of donors and friends, including friends of friends, have come to the rescue by pooling resources.

LIVELIHOOD SUPPORT

Project Joseph and Peter Project



Our two long running programs continued to serve the community. Project Joseph provided equipment to people who possess skills but lack the tools to allow them to earn a living while the Peter Project turned over boats to fishermen's helpers or those who lost theirs to a natural disaster.

LIVELIHOOD SUPPORT

Artisans of Hope



NVC Foundation's home grown initiative for urban poor under the Artisans of Hope Livelihood Workshop also continued to churn out beautiful ornaments, art pieces and fashion accessories, most of these upcycled from broken tiles, discarded Nespresso coffee capsules and eggshells.

PARTNERSHIPS



Angat Buhay Foundation (Angat Pinas, Inc.) inked a partnership agreement with NVC Foundation as an implementor to their Nutrition Program focusing on children under five years old and using Mingo Meals as the primary complementary food for a daily 180-day protocol.

The partnership also allowed us to tap into the large pool of active and dedicated volunteers who help deliver the program to the nutritionally challenged children and their mothers.

The first three areas enrolled in the program were Bacolod City and the municipalities of Himamaylan in Negros Occidental and Janiway in Iloilo.

PARTNERSHIPS



Rise Against Hunger Philippines and NVC Foundation – USA

Their requirement for dehydrated fruits and vegetables forged the beginning of a long running partnership with Rise Against Hunger Philippines which rose beyond the traditional buyer-supplier relationship. They have included NVC as part of some of their programs including food rescue, which is the practice of collecting edible food that would otherwise go to waste being near their “sell by” dates and distributing these to indigent families or institutions serving the marginalized.

NVC Foundation – USA was established primarily upon the initiative of Mac Harman, the CEO of Balsam Brands, a global company that has been supporting many of NVC’s projects for almost a decade. Our sister organization which shares our name turns over a 100% of all their donations received for our program implementation in the Philippines. They are a 501 (c) 3 accredited non-profit organization by the US government’s Internal Revenue Service (IRS) that allows US residents to enjoy tax credits for their donations.

FUNDRAISING PARTNERS

NVC Foundation's regular fundraising partner is the annual Mikel Lovina Jamboron, a run that commemorates the passing of Mikel Lovina who passed away at the age of 18 in a car accident 25 years ago. A fun run that started among his relatives, this has emerged over time into a fundraiser wherein Mingo Meals are earned for every kilometer ran. Runners from different parts of the Philippines and other countries have helped us provide Love Bags (back packs with school supplies) to children of Indigenous Peoples in Visayas and Mindanao, and Mingo Meals to nutritionally challenged children in many provinces of the Philippines, including those affected by natural disasters in Taal and Siargao.

Several brands and enterprises such as Tiny Buds, The Kind Cookie, Marissa's Artisan Ice Cream and many more in the Philippines, as well as Mamaloos Bakeshop in Las Vegas, USA, have given NVC a share of their sales to support our needs. Immediately after Typhoon Odette devastated southern Negros Occidental, the Havaianas brand committed to share a portion of their sales to restore lost livelihood. And even before they could raise the first peso, the company advanced funds to restore the shattered livelihood of 36 oyster growing families. Balsam Brands, a global mail order company, has been encouraging their employees to organize fundraisers for NVC annually, with the company matching whatever has been raised and they have supported a range of projects and supplied us with many of our needs.

Various schools have engaged their students and parents in fundraisers from holding concerts such as Argento, organized by the University of Asia and the Pacific Chorale or organizing runs like the Canadian American School's Walk for Hope.

Space limitations disallow us from mentioning all fundraisers but every effort is appreciated and every bit raised helps NVC bring joy to needy and expectant hearts.



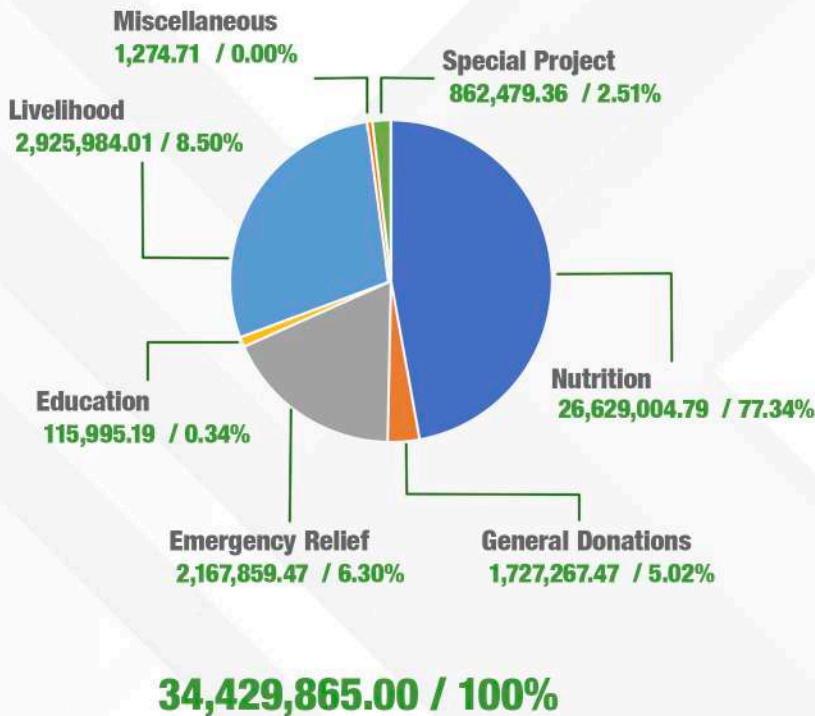


VOLUNTEERS

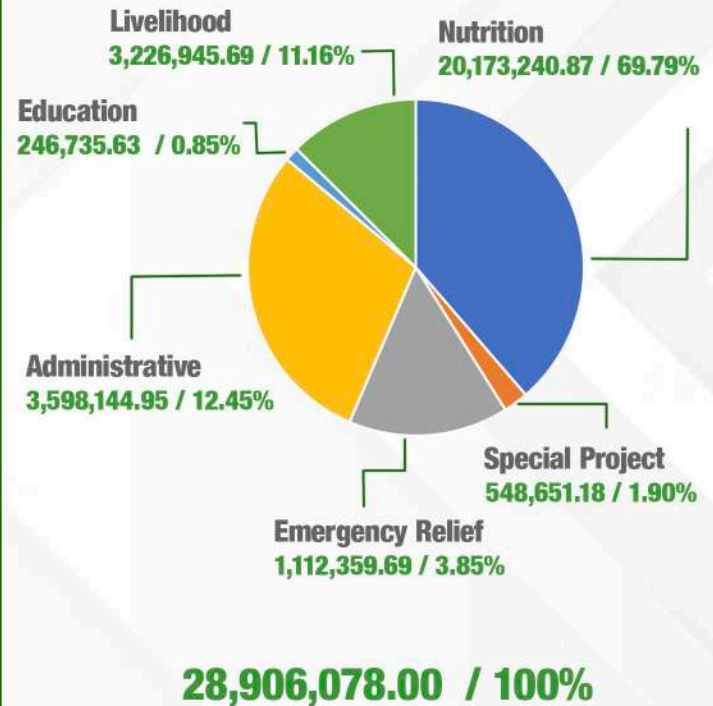

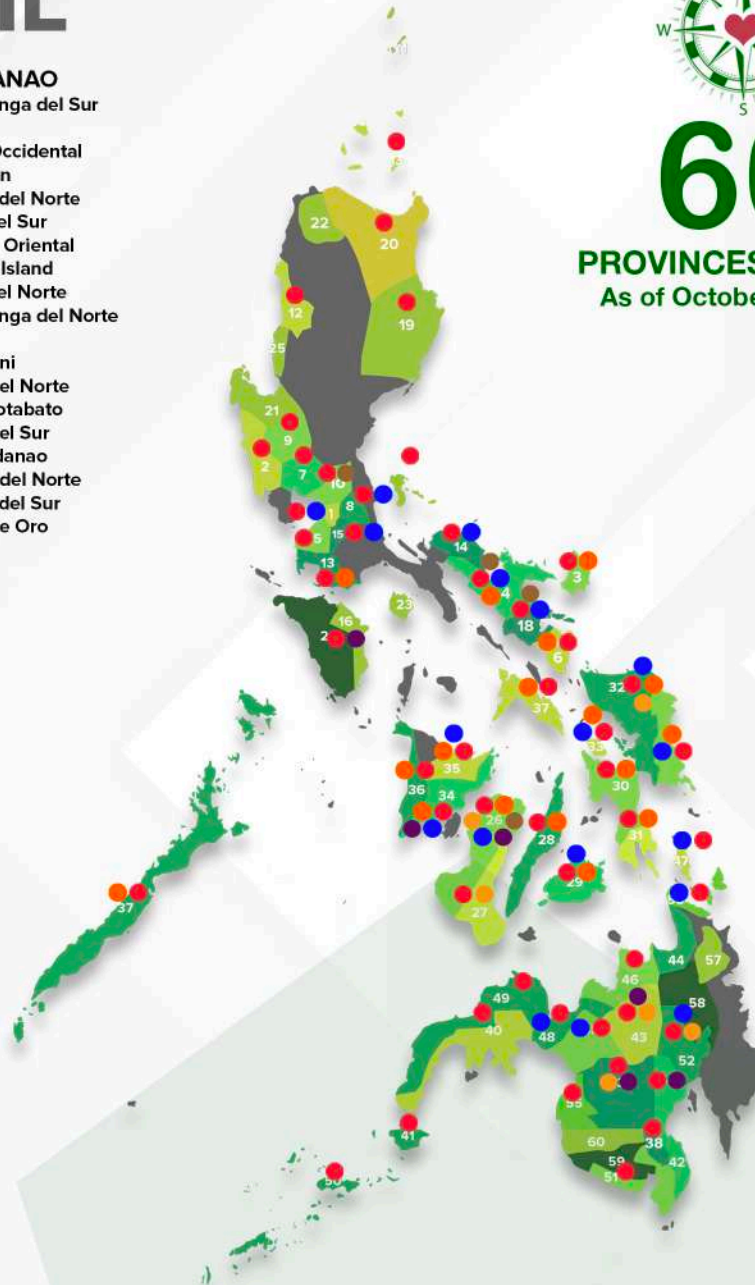

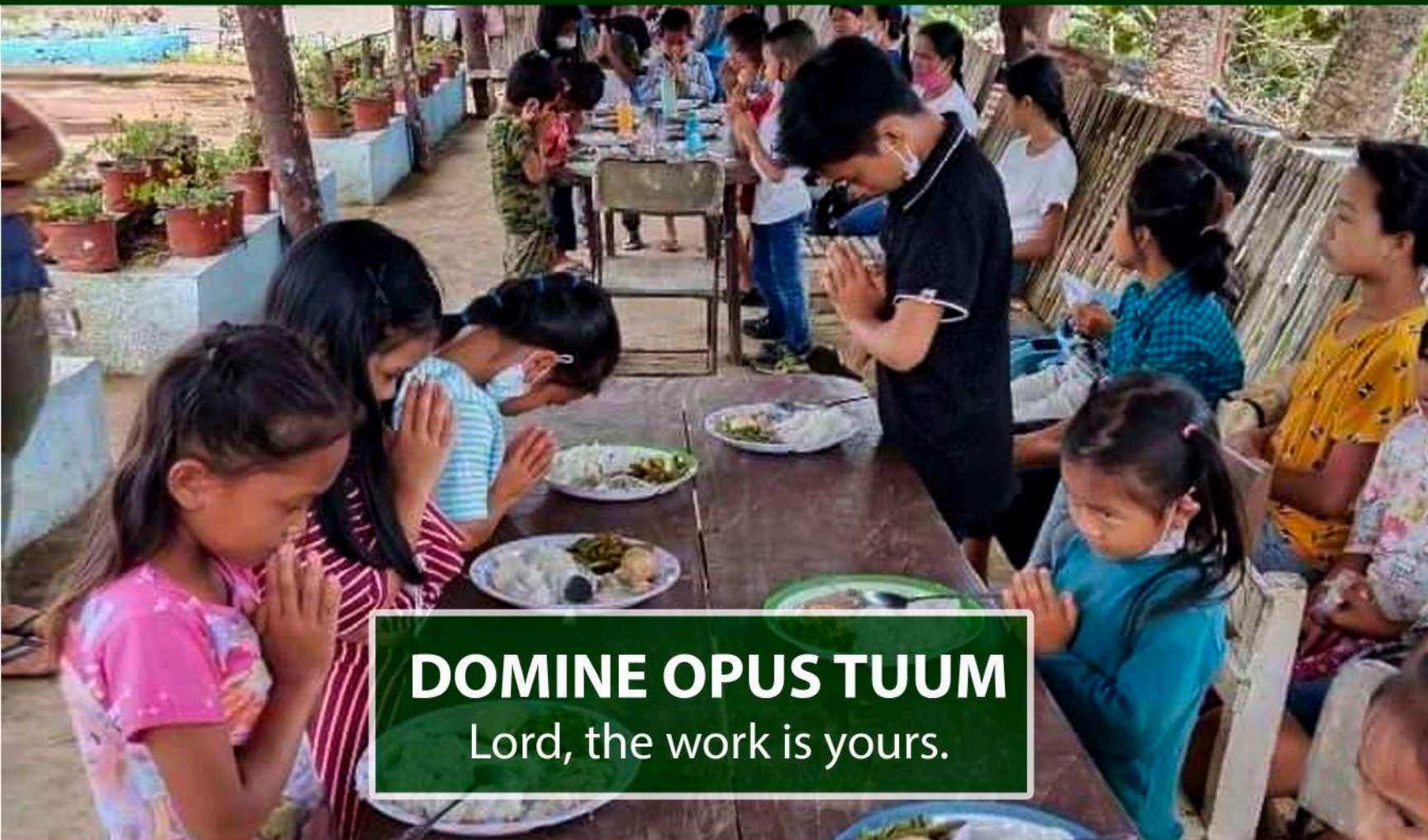
